
The roots, they hold the plant in place,

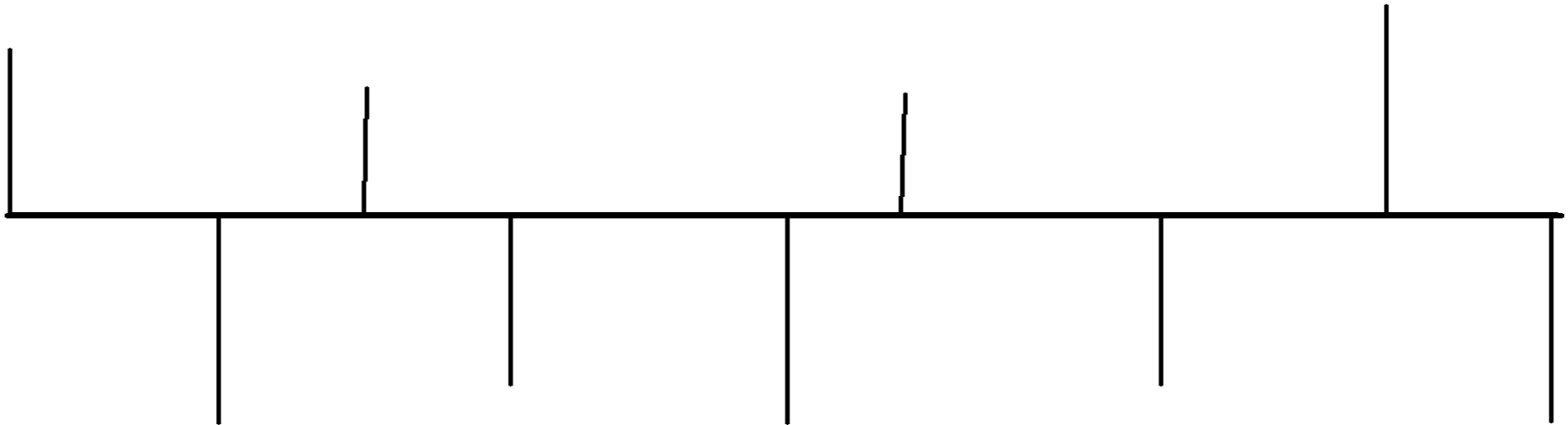

Activity 3 – Facts

Oscar-Claude Monet (1840-1926) was a famous French painter and one of the founders of the Impressionism movement (along with his friends Renior, Sisley and Bazille).

Claude Monet was born on November 14, 1840 in Paris.

In 1851 he went to the Le Havre secondary school of the arts.

Around 1856 he met Eugène Boudin, who taught he how to paint in oils.

In 1861 Monet was drafted into military service. His father refused to pay for an exemption, when Monet refused to give up painting.

In 1870 he moved to England, after the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War.

In 1890 Monet bought a house in Giverny, France.

In 1899 he started painting the water lilies, which he would continue to do for the next 20 years.

In 1923 he had two operations to remove his cataracts.

Monet died on December 5, 1926 of lung cancer.
